The guide concludes with a section on clinical considerations in which students are encouraged to apply biopsychosocial assessments and analyze clinical cases using the biopsychopharmacological model. Written for future clinicians who will not prescribe medication but would benefit from a working knowledge of psychopharmacological interventions, *Basic Psychopharmacology Principles* is ideal for courses in social work, psychology, counseling, and marriage and family therapy.
