One of the editors to work on the Oblique Light manuscript described it as of ‘absolutely major importance’.About the Author:David Robbins has received numerous awards for his writing, beginning with a CNA Literary Award in 1986 and culminating twenty-four years later with a Lifetime Achievement Literary Award supported by the South African Department of Arts and Culture.
